"The families we serve have endured many hardships, which is why we want them to have an uplifting experience when they come to pick out their furniture," said Furniture Bank Executive Director Rob Boyle. "United Way understands this in ways many organizations wouldn't, so they were all-in with us on this project."

Boyle is quick to add this is only one way that United Way is helping the Furniture Bank bring about positive change. "We've been a United Way partner for years," Boyle said. "And when we wanted to expand our mission into Wayne County and Detroit, their support was instrumental, which is why

## Podina family makes a house a home with items from the Furniture Bank

Patricia and Chad Podina and their 11-year-old son, Jacob, are recent beneficiaries of the Furniture Bank, its generous donors and the compassion of the nonprofit's staff.

This Auburn Hills family received a kitchen table and chairs, a recliner and second living room chair, a sofa and two "gorgeous dressers," in Patricia's words. The family is now getting settled into their new home, where they finally have a place to sit, watch TV and eat.

"The people there are so kind and non-judgmental," she said. "It's hard to go someplace when you're feeling down. You leave there feeling so much better."

The family found out about the Furniture Bank while working with Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Auburn Hills and the St. Vincent DePaul Society. Once they received a referral, they were able to visit the Pontiac nonprofit's warehouse and select their furniture. They also received help in the form of beds from church members.

Patricia is settling into working two jobs and Chad works for a local landscape company. They are happy to have found

and furnished their home after relocating from Kentucky.

Jacob has autism and Patricia said her son particularly appreciated the furniture. "Not having furniture really affected Jacob. He didn't want to live here (without furniture)" she said. "He loves it now". Staff at the Furniture Bank are "heroes to him," she added.

Patricia said she appreciates the help given by the Furniture Bank. "It was a great experience," she added.

we're proud to display the United Way logo on the truck we purchased for our expansion."

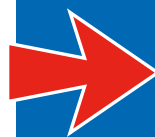
